**Housing**

- On-campus housing is normally available for exchange students staying for 1 or more semesters.
- The dormitory rooms (\$1711 - 1821/semester) are double (with each student having his/her own room) with a shared washroom and refrigerator.
- Students in the chalet apartments (\$1953/semester) share a 4-bedroom unit.
- Students in the dormitory rooms share a communal kitchen or dine in the pay-per-meal cafeteria. Each chalet apartment has two washrooms, a full-sized kitchen, dining area and living room. All on-campus accommodations include internet access (WiFi and wired), electricity and telephone services (long-distance charges extra).

**Language proficiency requirements**

For full undergraduate exchange:

- TOEFL 79 or better overall (with at least 20 in reading and writing and no less than 17 in listening and speaking)
- 6.5 IELTS or better overall (with at least band 6 in reading and writing)
- TOEIC 905 or better overall
- CAEL 60 or better overall (with at least two bands at 60 or better in reading/writing/listening/speaking and no band below 50)

A copy of the score results is required with the exchange or IEBP-G application. Sub-scores required for IEBP-G level 1 and 2 are as follows:

- Level 1: IELTS (no sub-score less than 5 and a minimum writing score of 5.5); TOEFL (minimum writing score of 16); CAEL (minimum writing score of 40).
- Level 2: IELTS (no sub-score less than 5.5 and a minimum writing score of 6.0); TOEFL (minimum writing score of 18); CAEL (minimum writing score of 50).

| Students planning to study for more than one semester                             | <p>The exit exam for the IEBP-G is the Canadian Academic English Language (CAEL) Assessment. Grenfell Campus offers the CAEL Assessment at the end of every semester. A student's score on the CAEL Assessment determines their level of study for the following semester. For example, if an IEBP-G student's scores on the CAEL Assessment meet the minimum proficiency requirements for undergraduate study and that student was provisionally accepted for Full Exchange at Grenfell, he or she may study as a Full Exchange Student in the following semester. Or, if a student in IEBP-G Level 1 earns a score on the CAEL assessment that meets the minimum proficiency requirements for IEBP-G Level 2, that student may progress from Level 1 to Level 2 in the following semester.</p> <p>Please note that students may apply for IEBP-G Level 1 or 2 and the Full Exchange Program concurrently but students applying for IEP may not. While some students occasionally move from IEBP-G Level 1 to the Exchange Program based on their CAEL Assessment scores after the first semester, it is not to be expected. It is important that all students wishing to study more than one semester at Grenfell Campus are fully aware that their CAEL Assessment scores at the end of their first semester determine their program of study for the following semester. Students in IEBP-G Level 2 who plan to study as Full Exchange students in the following semester but do not attain the necessary CAEL Assessment score will be permitted to repeat IEBP-G Level 2 if there is space available.</p> |



| ESL program summary    | <p>Intensive English Programs at Grenfell are full-time programs of academic English study to prepare students to meet the language demands of full-time university course work. Programs are offered at three levels. In the Intensive English Bridge Program levels (1 and 2) students are permitted to take one or two academic courses as part of their program of language study. Due to Corner Brook's position as a retail center for western Newfoundland, it has the amenities of a much larger city, including shopping malls, a cinema, recreational and cultural facilities. Grenfell Campus is located approximately 1.5 kilometers from Corner Brook's downtown core, which has numerous shops, businesses and restaurants. The Corner Brook Stream Trails, a network of scenic walking paths around the city, can be accessed from campus, and Marble Mountain ski resort is located just a 5 minute drive outside of the city. 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| <p>Support for international students</p>                                    | <p>Grenfell Campus offers the services of an Exchange Coordinator and Student Programming Coordinator (International) to inbound exchange students. Some of the services provided may include, but are not limited to: assistance with course registration and housing application, pre-arrival inquiries, airport pick-up upon arrival, peer-correspondent program, international student orientation, holiday programs, workshops for student development, international/multiculturalism events, and the hospitality club. Additionally, the IEP/IEBP-G program hires student assistants to coordinate activities and community involvement for students.</p>  |
| <p>How to get to Grenfell Campus</p>   | <p>Corner Brook is a 40 minute drive from the nearest airport, Deer Lake Regional (YDF). From outside of Canada, students will clear customs in cities such as Toronto, Montreal, Halifax or St. John's, then catch a domestic connecting flight to Deer Lake Airport. Deer Lake Airport is serviced by Air Canada, which has several codeshare partners internationally with the Star Alliance. | <p>Advice on selecting students for Grenfell Campus, Memorial University</p> | <p>Because we are a small campus, in a smaller city, we recommend Grenfell as an option for students who are independent and adventurous. Students interested in outdoor activity, community and campus involvement and sports tend to do very well at Grenfell Campus. Our class sizes are small and the campus is very friendly, so our campus is a good location for students who want the opportunity to improve their English language skills, experience a university lifestyle, and a new culture. Our city does have good amenities for a city of its size; however, students interested in a more urban experience (shopping, restaurants, etc.) are likely to find our location challenging.</p>  |
